



Firestone lauds contractors for community work

The following roofing firms took part in the Firestone Community Service Program, sponsored by Firestone Building Products Co.:

- AAA Roofing Co. Inc., Indianapolis, installed a new roof over the childcare and preschool classrooms at St. Luke's Methodist Church in Indianapolis. The project involved crew members installing a 60-mil fully adhered EPDM roofing system with metal flashing and polyiso-tapered insulation.
- Crafts Inc., Manitowoc, Wis., installed a 2,592-square-foot metal roofing system with .032 aluminum soffit and 24-gauge panels on the basketball pavilion at the David Richardson Memorial Basketball Courts in Kimberly, Wis.
- J.M. Young and Sons Inc., Belleville, Pa, installed a 60-mil fully adhered EPDM roofing system with 1/2-inch fiberboard insulation over a 1,000-square-foot portion of the Malta Home in Granville, Pa. - John R. Imbt Inc., Troy, Pa., assisted Western Alliance Emergency Services of Troy, Pa., by re-roofing its deteriorating 11,100-square-foot roof with a 60-mil fully adhered EPDM roofing system. Western Alliance offers volunteer medical emergency services, advanced and basic treatment, and transportation to requested facilities and/or functions to its surrounding communities.
- N. F. Mansuetto and Sons Inc., Martins Ferry, Ohio, installed a 3,000-square-foot, 60-mil fully adhered EPDM roofing system with 1-inch polyiso insulation for Hopeful City in Wheeling, W. Va. Hopeful City is a non-profit, faith-based organization dedicated to providing congregational leaders with the strength to create a positive change in their congregation and/or community.
- NorthStar Construction Service Corp., Leominster, Mass., installed a 5,700-square-foot roof at the new location of the Loaves and Fishes Food Pantry Inc., in Devens, Mass., using tapered polyiso insulation and a 60-mil fully adhered EPDM roofing system. The organization provides the homeless and needy with food, emergency shelter, resource referral, and other temporary services while promoting independence and self reliance.



NorthStar also helped put a new roof on the almost 100-year-old building of the Finnish Center at Saima Park, Fitchburg, Mass., a non-profit organization dedicated to preserving the Finland culture and integrating it into U.S. culture. For the project, NorthStar installed an 1,100-square-foot, 60-mil fully adhered EPDM roofing system with 1-inch polyiso insulation and metal around the edges.
